Access to the Albright Institute's library and to other local academic libraries on the Web 2009–2010

Dear Fellow,

Welcome to the library of the Albright Institute. This document is meant to help you navigate your way through our library and bibliographical information. Please don't hesitate to ask me or the other library staff if you have additional questions regarding information not included in this sheet. You may also inquire from Joe Uziel, the Ernest S. Frerichs Fellow/Program Coordinator, on how to arrange permission to use the libraries mentioned below (where applicable).

1. The online catalogue of the **Albright library** is accessible via the Institute's website at:

2. The library catalogues of Israel's universities, as well as those of the majority of Israeli colleges and higher education institutions, share a national union catalogue called **MALMAD** (which uses the ALEPH 500 library on-line catalogue system). This national union catalogue is divided into a union catalogue of books (ULI), a union catalogue of journals (ULS), and a union catalogue of electronic journals (ULE). In one search, the reader is able to find the relevant material in any of the participating libraries in MALMAD throughout Israel. Note that as in any institute, access to the electronic journals is available only to authorized students and staff.

INSTRUCTIONS ON HOW TO USE MALMAD:

3. The library of the **Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA)** is included in the MALMAD catalogue, as described above. Especially noteworthy is the IAA article catalogue.

The online catalogue of the **Digital Library for International Research (DLIR)** serves as the union catalogue for the holdings of more than 25 American overseas libraries, including the American Academy in Rome (AAR), the American Center of Oriental Research (ACOR) in Jordan, the American Institute for Yemeni Studies (AIYS), the American Research Center in Egypt (ARCE), the American Research Institute in Turkey (ARIT), the American School of Classical Studies at Athens (ASCSA), and the Cyprus American Archaeological Research Institute (CAARI).
